Department Update

Having been back for just over a year, we thought you might enjoy hearing a little about our currently open departments. Here is the inside scoop.

Hospital Gift Shop



The hospital employees call the Gift Shop their "Happy Place." It gives them a friendly place to get away and shop for yummy snacks and merchandise at reasonable prices. Auxiliary Volunteers also receive extra savings on most items offered. Our 23 Gift Shop volunteers go above and beyond helping serve the public and raise funds for the hospital.

Courtesy Shuttle

Often our Courtesy Shuttle is the first experience people have with Tri-City Hospital. About every passenger we pick up is very appreciative, especially in inclement weather or if they are handicapped. This was especially true during the Vaccine Clinic.

On my first day three years ago I picked up a woman who was in labor after driving to the hospital herself. I will never forget that. We currently have 12 hard working, dedicated volunteers but could use two more.

Information Desk

The Information Desk was among the first departments to open during the pandemic, which excited everyone. We lost a few people but with the help of Orientation, were able to gain new people. We currently have 29 volunteers working two shifts per day.

Coming back was good for us and for the hospital administration and employees, who were delighted to see us again. Besides giving visitor passes, we give directions, deliver flowers, learn a new computer program, and occasionally take people to their destination in a wheelchair. We also keep various supplies on hand.

We have new visitor policies, which was a bit difficult as families were unhappy with limited visit times. This has improved, especially with the help of Security as they helped enforce the rules. All in all, the Information Desk is a busy place and helpful to all people entering Tri-City Medical Center.

Patient Escort Department

The Patient Escort Department is an interesting and fun place to work. We are the first group of Auxiliary volunteers many patients interact with when they come to Tri-City Medical Center for appointments.

We provide escort service for patients and family members who have come to the hospital for a procedure in a Department at TCMC. Our duties include the following:

- ♦ After the registration process is complete, we escort the patients to the appropriate TCMC service area.
- We locate unused wheelchairs as needed and store them in the Registration Lobby area and at the front entrance.
- We assist visitors as needed in Lobby area and hallways.

We currently have 23 volunteers working two shifts, 8:00AM to Noon, and Noon to 4:00PM, Monday thru Friday each week. We still have openings for 3 or 4 more volunteers we hope to fill soon.

More Department Updates

Registration Department



Our department is a busy and important part of patient care at TCMC. Patients coming in for any hospital labs, x-rays, tests or procedures first stop at the Registration Center. Our Volunteers help record their names, give the information to the Registration personnel, then assist in making sure they get paperwork needed to have their tests or procedures done.

Our interaction with the patients is often among their first encounter with the hospital, so we have an opportunity to make their visit a pleasant one. One very funny conversation came from such an encounter! "While working the registration desk, our Brahms Lullaby played over the intercom. (I just love it when that happens!) I mentioned to our waiting patients that it meant a baby was just born at hospital. An elderly man who was sitting there looked up and said, "Do they play TAPS when somebody dies?"

You just never know what a conversation will bring! It is interesting and enjoyable. We are always looking for more volunteers.

Clerical Department

The clerical office is open to continue being of service to our Auxiliary. Our volunteers have been really happy to be back working in the office. Presently, the hours they are open are:

Monday- 8:00am-1:00pm Tuesday, Wednesday Thursday- 8:00am-4:00pm Friday- 12:00pm-4:00pm

If you have a need to go to the office or need to arrange for a new volunteer, please call the office at (760) 940-3125 and schedule a specific time. We occasionally may have a shift or even a day where we might not have clerical staff available to open the office, so scheduling or calling is a must.



Workshop Department



Workshop meets twice a month in a small room on the lower level of the hospital. Because of space limitations, we have a group of just six volunteers.

Our group makes special gifts for the hospital patients, like holiday tray cards for patients food trays, Lovey Dolls that serve as "bonding blankies" between parents and newborns in the NICU, Christmas stockings for newborns, and stuffed toys for ER. We even make a special stocking for the first baby born at Tri-City Hospital each year.

Since 1973, our Auxiliary has awarded scholarships to deserving nursing and medical students from our community. The first scholarship of \$100 went to a Licensed Vocational Nursing student and since then \$1,238,650 has been delivered by this important program – a remarkable feat.



At the 49th Annual Scholarship Awards Night on April 21, 2022, sixty-three scholarships of up to \$1,000 each were provided to outstanding students from California State University San Marcos, Mira Costa College, and Palomar College, as well as one of our own Auxiliary Volunteers studying for a medical career.



These awards are possible thanks to the planning of our Scholarship Committee and the financial gifts of our many generous donors. Over 20 groups and individuals were donors this year. These included many individual Auxilians, our Auxiliary Board of Directors, individual donors from the community, TCMC administration and staff, Tri-City Healthcare District Board of Directors, individual physicians, physician groups, and local retirement communities. Thanks to this generosity we were able to fund \$56,500 in scholarships this year alone.
