Dee Coleman orders our greeting cards, Chris Wellenstein takes care of the candy, Cathy Regan steams our clothing as needed, Juli Garon is responsible for our bookkeeping, and everyone else cleans, stocks shelves, and takes care of our customers.

We are now doing our own floral arrangements. This works much better as our flowers are fresher and our prices better. We have gotten many donated vases, which has really helped our profits. This is important as we hope to donate \$40,000 to the hospital in 2023.

Advocacy Department Returns

Our Auxiliary continues its sometimes slow but always determined return to service. In the last edition of Auxiliary Pulse we were pleased to announce the return of our NICU Department. We can now announce that Advocacy will be returning in January. While the exact date is not yet known, it will be after the Orientation session for that month.

Our Advocacy Department is one of the very few Auxiliary departments to actually enter patient rooms. Advocates first greet new patients, then determine how they feel they are being served at the Medical Center. Patients are also asked to rate the service they are receiving in an effort to improve future patient experiences.

Each Advocate is given a census of the hospital patients for that day. A list of new patients is prepared, and visits are made to rooms where patients are NOT considered contagious or otherwise restricted. These visits are more than information gathering steps. Patients are offered a friendly smile as well as comfort items like reading glasses or puzzles. If the situation warrants, visits by our Pet Therapy Team or Chaplain are also suggested.

After Advocates have completed their daily visits, each will prepare a report of comments and issues provided by the patients they visited. This report will be given to TCMC medical leadership for their information and action.

As a returning department, Advocacy is looking for individuals interested in this level of service. If you are interested or want more information, leave a note for Carol Saunders, Advocacy Chair, with the Clerical office and you will be contacted.

Code Orange Procedures

From time to time, we hear various "Codes" announced over the PA system. Many do not require volunteers to take action, but Code Orange is an exception. While this code is used infrequently, it is very important, and we should all know what to do. Here are the specific instructions for volunteers,

CODE ORANGE INSTRUCTIONS

When **CODE ORANGE** is announced on the overhead PA system:

- 1. All volunteers in the hospital are required to leave their assigned areas and proceed to the Information Desk at the entrance to the hospital.
- 2. At the Information Desk, a volunteer at that location should have placed the **CODE ORANGE**Notebook on the desk counter. If there is no volunteer on duty at the Information Desk, the **CODE**ORANGE Notebook can be found in an unlocked top drawer and the first volunteer arriving at the desk should locate it, open it, and put it on the counter.
- 3. Each volunteer must sign in on the sign-in sheet in the book with your name, assigned area, and phone number, either your personal cell phone number or department extension.
- 4. After signing in, please return to your assignment and await further instructions. The Command Center will contact needed volunteers from among those who have signed in.
- 5. One member of the Auxiliary Executive Board shall proceed to the Command Center in the French Rooms. If an Executive Board Member is not in the hospital, then an Auxiliary Board Member shall proceed to the Command Center. If no Auxiliary Board Member is in the hospital, then any volunteer may, and should, assume that responsibility.



Passings

We are sad to report that fellow Auxilian Lilly Crouch passed away suddenly on Christmas Eve day while baking cookies for friends and family. A dedicated Auxiliary volunteer since our return from Covid, Lilly logged nearly 500 hours in a very short period of time, working in both the Gift Shop and Clerical office.

She was active in her church, made props and costumes for the Carlsbad Readers Theatre, and loved golf - often volunteering at PGA and LPGA events. Her welcoming smile will be greatly missed.





Auxiliary "Dues" and Don'ts

With the announcement of a modest dues increase, we thought this might be a good time to let you, the membership, know just how important your financial support through dues is to our Auxiliary.

Even without salary costs and with TCMC providing significant equipment and office space, it is still costly to run our Auxiliary. Most of these costs are fixed, meaning they don't vary based on the size of our membership. This is important to know given that we had over 500 dues-paying members prior to the Covid-19 lockdown and currently have not quite 180 members.

So what are these costs? Several items are services we need that charge an annual subscription fee. These include our VOLTRAK system, the Microsoft Office used by Clerical, and the services needed for our website. There are also certain office supplies and mailing costs not provided by TCMC. We also purchase the various awards we give our members to recognize the time and service they provide.

As a Non- Profit Corporation, we must file various forms with state and federal government departments. Preparation of these requires professional legal and accounting assistance.

Recently your Board adopted budget items for these costs of \$9,500. We are confident that our recruitment efforts and some general fundraising will meet this need. Your contribution, through dues or additional gifts, will help assure our continued vitality.
