For patients undergoing planned surgery or a variety of tests, the Registration Department is where they begin once they are cleared by Security. At Registration, the Auxilian helps the patient fill out a simple form asking for name, birthdate, time of appointment, and scheduled procedure.

The slip is then given to a hospital employee who begins the registration process confirming insurance and other information. Once this is finished, the patient is assisted by an Auxiliary Patient Escort.

Some Medical Center departments perform their own registration. These include Women's Center, Cardiology, and MRI. These patients go directly to the appropriate department.

As any visit to a hospital can be stressful, Registration Auxilians make every effort possible to be cheerful and kind, and to try to put the patient at ease.

Relaxed Masking Requirements

As you may know, there have been big changes at the hospital when it comes to the wearing of masks. As of April 3, the wearing of masks at Tri-City Medical Center will depend on the current level of Covid transmission in our community as determined by state health officials. Three tiers of transmission have been established to determine when and where masks are required. Here is a quick overview.

Tier 1: Minimal Transmission - When we are in a Tier 1 condition masking will be optional for staff and the public in all areas except those traditionally requiring masks.

Tier 2: Moderate Transmission - This level recommends, but does not require, that masks be worn throughout the hospital to protect yourself and those near you.

Tier 3: High Transmission - Should a Covid surge reach this point masking will once again be required throughout the hospital.

Posters, like one of the three to the right, will be placed at the entrances to the hospital. Since the level of mask mandate may vary, it is suggested that we each bring a mask with us for our shift to be prepared.

While this may be good news to many Auxilians, please keep in mind that some of our members are more comfortable wearing a mask at the hospital. This is certainly their choice, and we hope all will

respect their wishes by refraining from any negative comments about masking.

As you may be aware, Steve Dietlin, CEO of the Tri-City Medical District, recently retired. For his entire time at TCMC Mr. Dietlin has been a strong supporter of the Auxiliary and our mission. Parking Made Easier


