Department Spotlight

Pet Therapy

Our friendly pooches continue to bring smiles and joy to patients, staff, and Auxilians at Tri-City Medical Center. Regularly included in our visits are the visitor lobby areas, the orthopedic areas, and some patient floors. We love the smiles on patients and staff.

Unfortunately, our numbers are down, limiting the use of the Pet Therapy card to record which patients would like a visit. We continue to look for pet therapy teams to grow our department and hope to increase the number of days and visits we can make in the not-too-distant future.



All our teams look forward to seeing you and all our TCMC friends and partners soon.



Advocacy



After a three-year absence, Advocates returned in January with ten volunteers currently providing five days of service per week, Monday through Friday. Each volunteer serves one shift per day.

Advocates visit patients after their first full day at Tri-City Medical Center offering a caring word, a listening ear, simple comforts or helping with concerns. They provide patients with booklets about the hospital, puzzle packets, and reading glasses. We also provide blankets and pillows and show how to use equipment like phones, TV, call buttons.

When appropriate, Advocates arrange for Pet Therapy or Chaplain visits and help patients fill out positive employee comments cards asking patients to rate their care on a scale of one through five with five as outstanding. Advocates advise nurses of patient concerns and their praise for the care they receive. After each shift, Advocates record each patient visit on the computer, allowing hospital leadership to quickly hear patient satisfaction or concerns.

Coming back has been a challenge that we are meeting and we are glad to be back providing comfort, care and companionship for Tri-City patients. It is so rewarding to have Tri-City staff tell us that they are so glad that we are back!






Surgery Department – Rosalind Bussey

Passings

We are deeply sorry to report that Auxiliary Past President Mildred Hill recently passed away. Joining in 1990, Mildred served more than 12,500 hours and was awarded Life Member status for her long service. She was president from July of 1993 through June of 1995. Following her term as president, Mildred served on the Board of Directors from 1995 to 1999.

As president, she headed the effort to gain tax exempt status, also known as 501(c)(3) tax status, for the Auxiliary. Past President Beth Hulsart remembered her noting, "Mildred was one of those members who helped us keep to the mission of the original Auxiliary members."



Meet the New President and CEO Dr. Gene Ma



As Auxilians, we know Dr. Ma as a dedicated, smiling doctor and engaged leader. We thought it might be interesting to get to know more about the man. The son of a State Department Diplomat, Dr. Ma's early years were spent living abroad in Burma, Japan, and Hong Kong. From junior high school on, however, he lived in Arcadia giving him a love for Southern California.



He married his high school sweetheart 31 years ago and they have five daughters, one still living at home. Rounding out the family is a female Cavalier King Charles Spaniel. As he told us, being "Dad" is a big part of who he is at home. Dr. Ma also thinks of himself as a "hands on" do-it-yourself sort of guy and proved this fact by building his own Cobra racecar (the kind you actually drive) from a kit. Pretty cool.

A graduate of UCSF School of Medicine, Dr. Ma interned at Stanford and did his residency in Emergency Medicine at UC San Diego. He joined Tri-City Medical Center in 2000 noting that he was

attracted to our sense of community and the down-to-earth people he would work with. He was Chief of Staff from 2015 to 2017, Chief Medical Officer from 2019 to 2023, and now serves as President and CEO of Tri-City Healthcare District.

From 2012 to 2022 he was CEO of WorkPartners, an occupational health and workers compensation practice in Oceanside. In this role Dr. Ma was able to reverse the company's financial difficulties and return it to a successful medical practice.

In his new role as TCHD President and CEO he sees opportunities as TCMC seeks new and innovative partnerships to

the confidence of the community. While the final decisions will be up to the Healthcare District Board of Directors, these partnerships will be diverse and could include individual departments, expanding outpatient services, or even grander partnerships.

We asked him about the role of the Auxiliary in the Tri-City future. His immediate response was that our absence during COVID highlighted our vital role. As he put it, "You truly don't know what you have till you lose it. Our staff delivers great medicine, but in many ways the Auxiliary is the heart and soul of the hospital."

We welcome Dr. Ma to his new position and look forward to working with him.
