

Flu Shots

It is once again that time of year. All Employees, Auxiliary, and Medical Staff are now welcome to stop by Employee Health Services for their annual flu vaccine.

<u>Beginning September 18</u> <u>Monday – Friday (except holidays and flex days)</u> 7:30am – 4:00pm (Closed noon to 1:00pm for lunch)

- A flu vaccination declination form is required for those choosing not to receive the flu vaccine and must be submitted to Employee Health Services by November 30, 2023.
- External documentation is accepted for those who choose to get the flu vaccine elsewhere and must be submitted to Employee Health Services by November 30, 2023.
- Persons choosing not to receive a flu vaccine will be required to wear a mask beginning November 30, 2023 through March 31, 2024.



A POSITIVE PATH FORWARD: AN UPDATE FROM TRI-CITY'S CEO

Dear Tri-City Team,

As we look toward the future of Tri-City, I am excited to share our progress and address some important topics that have been circulating lately. Let's embark on this journey together with transparency, optimism, and a focused vision.

Our Financial Outlook and Recent Developments

First and foremost, I want to emphasize Tri-City's commitment to our community remains unwavering. While the past couple of years have brought challenges to our doorstep, we've worked tirelessly to address them head-on. The rising costs of healthcare coupled with stagnant reimbursement rates, COVID-related financial losses, and unprecedented inflation have affected our financial health. However, let me address some of the misinformation that has been circulating. First, there have been rumors about Tri-City being sold.

Second, Tri-City is not insolvent. We've been very transparent in our employee engagement discussions and in communications with our community that the last two fiscal years have been extremely challenging. We have navigated these rough waters with determination and are already implementing plans that promise a brighter financial future. Our district is not burdened by any significant debt obligations, we have tremendously valuable assets, and we are already delivering on our turnaround and cash flow plans. This means that unlike many other facilities, Tri-City's struggles are short term.


We must remain persistent in our commitment to address our issues, and focus on meeting our long-term commitment to the community and patients we serve.

The past few years have significantly impacted our reserves and savings. As a result, we have met the criteria to apply for the distressed hospital loan program through the State of California. This program provides interest-free loans to hospitals with solid turnaround plans and offers a chance for us to support our financial goals. I am pleased to announce that we recently received notification of one of the largest sums awarded in the State—\$33.2 million. This substantial support underscores our significance within the community and reflects the confidence that State financial analysts have in our turnaround strategy. This funding provides us with a bridge—a bridge to a future where we can rebuild and emerge even stronger.

Women & Newborn Services and Our Path Ahead

I know there are hopes that the loan will lead to the reopening of Women & Newborn Services (WNS). While I share your desire for a return of these services, it's important to recognize the loan serves as a catalyst for change, not an instant solution to our past challenges. To ensure a successful turnaround, we must remain committed to our carefully designed plans. This has involved tough decisions essential to the sustainability and growth of our hospital.







Rest assured, our board is dedicated to exploring partnerships that will eventually pave the way for a revitalized WNS—one that honors our long-standing commitment to our dedicated staff and our community.

5. Be Our Ambassadors


Stand up for our hospital and take pride in the care we provide. Let's collectively silence any false rumors with the truth about our unwavering dedication.

The Ways and Means Director provides the Board with financial analysis relating to the fiscal impact of events or activities. He also leads all memorial fund and planning efforts.






Linda Wolff – President Emeritus

To say that the ICU staff is overjoyed to have our volunteers back would be a major understatement. Same can be said of the volunteers who have returned to their previously held positions in ICU.


