- Our quarterly Pulse continued its wonderful communication; isn't it great?

- Our Non-Profit status was updated and confirmed, which involved much work.
- COVID mandates relaxed allowing staff, patients, visitors, and volunteers to feel a palpable sense of hope and gratitude in the building.

Department Spotlight

Patient Escort - Kathey Cramm, Chair

With 22 active members, our Patient Escort team operates two shifts daily Monday through Friday. Each team member assists patients, family members, and visitors throughout the hospital. When individuals come to the hospital for a procedure, the Registration staff completes the initial paperwork, an Escort leads the patient to the designated TCMC service area. As we walk through the hospital we try to be friendly and talk with them, letting them know we care.



At the destination, we transfer the patient to hospital staff along with the necessary paperwork. Throughout our shift we also locate vacant wheelchairs and bring them to the Registration waiting area and the front entrance. When requested, we provide wheelchair service for patients and family members. We assist any visitor who stops us in the hallways and asks for help.

As with all Auxiliary departments, we dealt with the fallout from the recent cyber-attack. Additionally, recruiting and retention of volunteers remains our biggest challenge. During 2023 we haven't been able to fill all the shifts any given month. Thankfully, our dedicated members have stepped up to help.

In 2023 we celebrated four team members as Volunteer of the Quarter. Thank you, Kathy Ahlfors, Sheila Gross, John Haddock, and Peter Fusselman. We all look forward to 2024 and the exciting changes brought about by the partnership with UCSD Health.





Gift Shop - Carole Vance, 2023 Chair

To many hospital employees the Gift Shop is called the "Happy Place." Here they can relax, read some books, and visit with the volunteers. One main purpose of the shop is to provide extra funds to the hospital. Each June the Auxiliary donates the Gift Shop profits to the hospital at the Auxiliary Annual Meeting.

Before COVID we had 62 volunteers and were open every day for a total of 58 hours a week. Since we returned we are open 32 hours with about 20 volunteers. We try to have two volunteers per shift and the shifts are 9:30am to 1:30pm and 12:45pm to 4:45pm. The volunteers' main responsibility is to be helpful to customers, keep the shop clean, restock merchandise and candy.

We now create our own floral arrangements. This positive change has meant better arrangements and lower prices for customers. To date we have tripled our profits on the floral arrangements since making this change. We have two volunteer bookkeepers but, as with many departments, we need quite a few new volunteers.

This will be my final report as Dee Coleman became our Gift Shop Manager as of January 1st. We wish her much success.

As this very eventful year came to a close, the Auxiliary leadership, Directors and Department Chairs, met jointly for a wonderful breakfast buffet thanks to TCMC Director of Food and Nutrition, Pamela Lambert.

Dr. Gene Ma, TCMC CEO, took time to address our Auxiliary leadership at this meeting and, as is his practice, he thanked each and every Auxilian for their amazing service to patients and the community. As the transition to being a UCSD Health System hospital moves forward, he encouraged our continued involvement. President Bunny McElliott even presented him a tee

shirt to let everyone know that, "Our volunteers are better than yours."

To help put the upcoming change in perspective, Dr. Ma shared information on just how we got to this point. Community hospitals, like TCMC, have been slowly disappearing across the country. Changes in how health care is delivered and how services are paid for have been the major factors contributing to this change.

The Tri-City Medical Center financial situation had been deteriorating for quite a while driven heavily by unfunded mandates from both state and federal governments. Low Medicare and Medi-Cal reimbursements have

also contributed to the financial difficulties. The hospital has no ability to negotiate these rates as they are predetermined by the government agencies responsible for these programs.



As has been widely reported, the solution is an agreement to transfer the assets and operational control of TCMC to University of California San Diego Health. This change not only resolves the financial problem, it also creates wonderful new opportunities.

One exciting part of this change will be the return and strengthening of our Labor and Delivery and Neonatal Care

Unit. Currently the UCSD maternity unit is often full, with many patients from the North County area. Once fully operating, the TCMC campus will host numerous vibrant maturity services. Additionally, there are plans to make the TCMC campus a major NCI Cancer Center, the only such facility in San Diego County.

This exciting future makes 2024 a pivotal year. For the next few months UCSD and TCMC will be finalizing the agreements with turnover expected sometime this coming spring. This is a very exciting time, and our Auxiliary will continue as we have, making a difference in our community.





Assistant Treasurer Named

The Auxiliary recently added the new position of Assistant Treasurer to be filled by Mary Foy. Roz Bussey has been doing amazing work as our Treasurer and deserves the help.



Flu Shots - The Employee Health department has asked that we remind all Auxilians that during the current flu season all volunteers must either have a flu shot or wear a mask at all times when working. Free flu shots are available at Employee Health; however, they are the standard shot, not the enhanced shot recommended for seniors.

If you get your flu shot elsewhere, you need to bring proof to Employee Health during their working hours, Monday through Friday from 7:30am to 4:00pm. They are closed for lunch from Noon to 1:00pm. A sticker is provided for your badge when you have completed this process.

Dues are soon Due - Operating our Auxiliary as an independent organization is not without cost. We have fees, supplies, and other expenses. Your annual dues help us stay active and engaged. Dues are currently \$20 and are billed in January so keep an eye on your mailbox as the notices will go out shortly.

Dues envelopes will also be available in the Auxiliary office. Please fill out your contact information on the inside of the dues envelope. This information helps us update our member database (VOLTRAK) and is used for our annual directory.

Hours Awarded - During the cyber-attack in November and December, volunteers received a minimum of four hours credit if they showed up, even if they were sent home for lack of work. As of January 1st, we have returned to our standard practice of recording actual hours worked.
